### "TIS THE SEASON..."

...to be cautious. It is again the time of year where we see an increase in property damage. Though the holiday season is a time to reflect and be thankful, we also must be mindful. Safety should be on the "to do" list next to the turkey and tree.

<u>Candles:</u> A candle fire in the home is reported to a U.S. fire department every 34 minutes. Use sturdy, safe candleholders.

Protect candle flames with glass chimneys or containers.

Keep candles at least 12 inches from anything that can burn.

NEVER leave a burning candle unattended.

Keep children and pets away from burning candles.

Cooking: Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries.

Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking food.

Keep the stovetop, burners and oven clean.

Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.

Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Check electrical cords for cracks, breaks, or damage.

<u>Electrical:</u> U.S. fire departments responded to 20,900 incidents involving electrical equipment in 2005.

Replace or repair loose or frayed cords on electrical devices.

Avoid running extension cords across doorways or under carpets.

Always unplug lights before replacing light bulbs or fuses.

Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

Know your circuit capacity and DO NOT overload it.

<u>Tree:</u> In 2005, almost half, (48%) of home Christmas tree fires were caused by some type of electrical failure.

Keep live trees as moist as possible by giving them plenty of water daily.

Keep tees at least three feet away from any heat source.

Safely dispose of trees when they begin dropping needles.

Only use UL listed indoor or indoor/outdoor lights on trees.

Always unplug tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

Following these easy, sensible, no expense recommendations will allow you, your family and friends to have an enjoyable safe holiday season.

There may be some misconception as to who we are and what we do here at CCFD #5. First of all, we are what is called a "combination" department, which means that we have career firefighters and volunteer firefighters. Most of us are at least EMT basic level, along with a few IV technicians, and three paramedics. Over 70% of our emergency calls are medical or trauma, so that's the reason our crews have the emergency medical certifications.

There are six career personnel, and only twenty six volunteer firefighters.

Volunteer firefighters have the same training and education opportunities as the career folks, in some cases more, but they also have jobs to go to everyday. We here at Fire District #5 are now experiencing the lowest volunteer staffing levels ever. We need you!

Do you miss the good old days when you played on (fill in your team)? Do you miss the camaraderie of your teammates? Do you miss playing on a winning team? We here at CCFD #5 can help you. This is the place where teamwork and winning is what we're all about. Don't like the Emergency Medical Response thing? No problem. Firefighting could be your niche. # WHERE DOES THE WATER COME FROM WHEN THERE'S A FIRE?



We all know that it takes a lot of water to put out a large fire. There are three primary sources that we get our water from. Those sources are fire engines, water tenders and fire hydrants.

Fire engines are typically used for the "initial attack" at a fire. They normally hold about 750 gallons of water which is usually enough to extinguish a small to medium fire in a structure. That supply is limited. If we have a larger fire, we need to get more water from somewhere else.

Another place we can get a supply of water is from a water tender. We have two water tenders in our district. They are basically rolling water supplies that hold 3000 gallons each. They are most useful when a hydrant is unavailable or unusable. One drawback is that a tender is very large and is difficult to maneuver in tight spaces. They are also very heavy and need solid ground to be driven on.

That brings us to fire hydrants. Since the Fire District is responsible for fire engines and water tenders, I thought I would spend some extra time on hydrants and how the public can affect them. Everyone knows what they look like and I am sure you have seen them all around Kalama. Most of us take them for granted and don't realize that some of the things we do can affect the Fire District's ability to successfully extinguish a fire. Below are some of the common errors people make that can hinder our firefighting efforts.

<u>Parking in front of a hydrant:</u> If you park your car in front of a hydrant, the responding fire engine may not be able to connect to it and your house could burn down because they ran out of water. It is also possible to just drive by a hydrant because it is obstructed by your car. <u>Don't park in front of a fire hydrant!</u>


<u>Hydrants obstructed by foliage or fences:</u> We can't establish a water supply to our fire engine if we don't know it's there. If a hydrant is on or near your property, you have a responsibility to make sure it can be seen from the road. <u>Keep the hydrants in your area clear of obstructions!</u>

<u>Painted hydrants:</u> Some people don't like the bright colors of the hydrants near their property. Some have even painted them colors that make them blend in to their surroundings. One of the reasons they are bright colors is to make sure we can see them when we respond. Some hydrants are painted with reflective paint so they may be more easily seen at night. If we don't see it, we won't be able to use it. **Don't paint fire hydrants!** 

<u>Decorative hydrants:</u> This should be a no-brainer! If you have an inoperable hydrant in your yard, it is of no use to us. <u>Please identify such hydrants as inoperable so we don't try to get water out of them!</u>

Did you know that most all fire hydrants belong to the Water Department? They are responsible for installation, maintenance and repairs. There are some privately owned hydrants that do not fall under their jurisdiction. If you have any problems with a hydrant in your area, please contact the Water Department for assistance.

Remember, water is the single most important element needed to sustain life. It is also one of the most important elements needed to <u>save</u> life!
